Town Square Master Planning Process

This past spring, Midway City formed a working committee who was tasked with overseeing a master plan and visioning process for Town Square. The working committee consists of the mayor, two councilman, and two members of the community who were supported by city staff and a design consultant. The purpose of the master planning process was to create a long-term vision for Town Square that would guide the future improvement of the square. The master planning process would include opportunities for the community and stakeholder groups to provide feedback on the future of the square.

One of the first steps in the process was creating an RFP for a design consultant that would aid the city in the creation of the master site plan. The geographical boundaries of the master planning area was limited to Town Square, with emphasis on the areas outside of the existing buildings.

The RFP process identified three goals for Town Square:

- Design options for opportunities to enhance the use of green spaces in town square. It is very important that all design options must be able to accommodate all existing space needs for Swiss Days.
- Increase the value of Town Square to the community by creating opportunities to enhance the square as a community gathering place, thus providing increased economic growth.
- Create an environment which will provide additional pedestrian traffic in and around Main Street and the downtown area.

As a result of the RFP process, the city contracted with the IBI Group, who would help with the public outreach, visioning and concept design portion of the project. Additionally, a stakeholder committee was created that consists of Swiss Day and Midway Booster representatives along

with downtown business owners. Under the guidance of the committees, an online community questionnaire was created to help us better understand how people use Town Square, what they like/don't like about Town Square and what improvements they would like to see. A project vision statement and guiding principles were created to help guide the future design of the square.

With the feedback from the questionnaire and guidance from the working and steering committees, IBI created two design concepts, demonstrating an array of improvements that could occur on Town Square. These concepts were created as a tool to illustrate options for Town Square, allowing people to identify elements that they like or dislike. The concepts, along with the questionnaire results and vision and guiding principal documents were presented at two public open houses that were advertised on the city social media accounts and at the city owned kiosks. Once the open houses concluded, the project information was then posted to the city website, creating an extended public comment period. Approximately 60 individuals attended the open houses, resulting in 38 handwritten comments. As a byproduct of the open houses and online publication of the plans, we received an additional 27 emails with comments from 23 people. These comments have been reviewed by the working committee and design consultants and are being used to create an updated design concept.

After the open houses, the working committee met with a larger segment of the Swiss Day organizers to present and discuss the concepts. The Swiss Day group then discussed the plans internally and provided city staff with additional feedback.

IBI is in the process of creating an updated design concept based on the public comment and feedback received. It is anticipated that this design concept will be completed and presented to the committees in early January, followed by some type of public outreach in late January. It would then be presented to the City Council in February for consideration. The hope is that this process will result in the creation of a vision for Town Square as we look at future improvements and community needs.

Ensure all improvements can and will be properly maintained



- Optimize for community events, from large formal events (e.g. Swiss Days) to small
- Add elements to make the square more functional (e.g. benches, restrooms, etc.)
- Add elements that make the square a more interesting experience (e.g. enhanced)
- Implement solutions that are economically responsible and environmentally sustainable

Key Takeaways

The majority of people think that Town Square is doing a pretty good job. They think that it serves the community and represents the identity of Midway well.

The most liked elements of Town Square currently: Town Hall, ice skating rink, grove of trees, open lawn.

Least liked elements of Town Square currently: Tennis courts, community center, gazebo (needs updated at least).

Majority of people would like more reasons to visit on a daily basis, as long as those reasons don't make it overly busy and/or change the square too dramatically.

What do you like about good examples in other towns? (Below is a summary of the reponses to this question)

A true gathering place for the town that is the center of activity. A place that hosts various activities throughout the year (small concerts, food trucks, farmers markets, movie nights). Elements that make the square a more functional and interesting place to visit, such as flower gardens, statues, benches, water features. Strong sense of history and culture throughout.






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Would you support having more reasons to visit the Town Square for daily use? 141 responses



Option 1: Concept Plan

Inspired by the Swiss flag to add north/south and east/west pedestrian promenades resembling the cross of the flag

Promenades connect, highlight and organize existing facilities and pedestrian experience within the Town Square

Reduce pedestrian/vehicular conflict by eliminating internal drive and replace with pedestrian promenades which can be used for emergency

Addition of more event tent space along promenades to free up lawn space for entertainment or rental venues


Entertainment venues to optimize spectator viewing and embrace

Enchanted forest to highlight existing evergreen grove and create shade

Gateway ornamental groves at promenade entries with added picnic facilities, play areas and edge viewing conditions

Embrace ice rink plaza with promenade and walkways with multipurpose

Option 2: Concept Plan

Radial promenade/historic timeline framed with ornamental flower gardens creating a memorable pedestrian experience and organizing

Reduce pedestrian and vehicular conflict by eliminating internal drive

Embrace ice rink plaza as year-round feature with mulipurpose plaza and pavilion at East end as centrally located iconic element, event space


Emphasize mid-block pedestrian gateways on Main Street, 100N and 100W to provide improved and organized access and connectivity

Renovate or repurpose the existing Community Center into multipurpose facility to house permanent ice rink support space and seasonal uses such as public restrooms, bike hub and cultural experience. Modification could open line of site into the Town Square from Main Street to improve visual and physical connectivity

Annual/perennial gardens and the proposed windmill near 100N provide instagrammable moments and add cultural flavor to support the Swiss
